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## **MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR, PRESIDENT & CEO**

In 2023, the AGH saw the demand for embodied and engaging in-person experiences rise and exceed pre-COVID levels. The AGH presented 13 exhibitions and over 800 programs this year and the Gallery enjoyed an astounding 187,862 visitors, indicating a slow but unflinching rehabilitation from the events of recent years.

One of the key priorities in 2023 for management and the Board was to finalize the AGH's five-year strategic plan. Following thorough economic and social analysis, as well as extensive community and stakeholder consultations with artists, donors, members and artistic partners, the plan outlines key goals to;

- 1. Broaden the study of, and access to, the collections
- 2. Deepen access to, and understanding of, art and history
- 3. Build and deepen community relationships
- 4. Commit to the work of Truth and Reconciliation
- 5. Broaden public awareness through a strong identity and narrative
- 6. Develop long-term sustainability models
- 7. Anchor the AGH as an integral partner in the revitalization of Hamilton's downtown core

Conceived as a shared framework, this plan responsibly aligns the organization's artistic and social programming with shifting community needs over the next five years.

Over the course of this year, we were proud to present a variety of exhibitions that centered diverse voices and recognized a plethora of regional artistic talents. Highlights included *they have piled the stone / as they promised / without syrup* by artist Duane Linklater, a presentation of new works including a series of striking canvases that used abstracted architecture to reveal the labour and deceit ingrained in a chapel built by children forced to attend the former Shingwauk Residential School. Organized and circulated by The MacKenzie Art Gallery, *Radical Stitch* explored the profound technical skill of beading as an art form, revealing its vitality as a method of knowledge transfer and act of resistance. Curated by Yan Zhou, a series of artists scrutinized the impact of smog as a symbol and symptom of our world in the time of climate emergency in *Breathing in China: Art, Ethics, and Environment*.

میں اپنی ماں کی بیٹ ہوں *I am my mother's daughter* by Farheen Haq examined the artists' experience of motherhood, her relationship with her own mother, and her status as a settler on Haudenosaunee territory. Finally, the sprightly exhibition *WONDER: the real, the surreal, and the fantastic* brought together works that reimagined the everyday in search of new realities and creative freedom.

The AGH's growing outreach and commitment to partnerships saw resounding success in the way of travelling exhibitions in 2023, boasting the organization and circulation of the multi-year exhibition tour of the retrospective *Shelley Niro: 500 Year Itch* which saw its inaugurial installation at the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian in New York City. The exhibition will be on display at the AGH in early 2024 before moving on to the National Gallery of Canada in Ottawa, the Vancouver Art Gallery, and in 2025 will be installed at the Remai Modern in Saskatchewan. After exhibiting at the AGH in 2022, *Michèle Pearson Clarke: Quantum Choir* went on in 2023 to Plug In Institute of Contemporary Art in Winnipeg. Adding to the Gallery's library of publications, three exhibition catalogues were developed this year for *Shelley Niro: 500 Year Itch, Farheen Haq: I am my mother's daughter*, and the previous year's installation of the enthralling *Nathan Eugene Carson: Black Carnival*.

We are deeply grateful to have expanded our permanent collection of over 10,500 works with an additional 77 works this year. Including works by Kim Adams, Michèle Pearson Clarke, Elizabeth Doxtater, Hortense Gordon, Esmaa Mohamoud, Tony Scherman, Michael Snow, and Barbara Steinman, amongst others. Notable loans in 2023 include Tom Thomson, *Moonlight Over Canoe Lake*, 1916 and *Ragged Lake*, 1915, which were part of the touring exhibition *Tom Thomson: North Star* organized by the McMichael Canadian Art Collection and presented June 24, 2023 - January 14, 2024, before travelling to the Audain Art Museum in Whistler and the Beaverbrook Art Gallery in Fredericton. Tim Whiten, *Ouroboros*, 1976, *Mary's Permeating Sign*, 2006 and *Siege Perilous*, 1989, and *Siege Perilous*, 1989, were exhibited in *Tim Whiten: Elemental* co-organized between The Art Gallery of Peterborough, the Art Gallery of York University, Robert McLaughlin Gallery and the McMaster Museum of Art, with touring dates between 2022 and 2023. And recently returned to the Gallery, Robert Houle, *Kanehsatake*, 1990-1993 and *Aboriginal Title*, 1989-1990 were presented in *Robert Houle: Red is Beautiful* organized by the Art Gallery of Ontario and toured to Contemporary Calgary, the Winnipeg Art Gallery and the National Museum of the American Indian between 2021 and 2024.

In reflection of the successes of this year, we are thankful that a selection of our exhibitions and publications were recognized by the following awards. The Ontario Museums Association awarded the Excellence in Publications to *Artful Moments: Shared Learning* by Laurie Kilgour-Walsh, projecting a consistent growth in accomplishments culminating from consistent investments into wellness programming at the Gallery. Additionally, *Duane Linklater: they have piled the stone / as they promised / without syrup* curated by Melissa Bennett, was shortlisted by Galeries Ontario / Ontario Galleries for the Exhibition of the Year (Budget over \$20,000 Monographic). A broad suite of auxiliary programming complimented the year's exhibition themes, both cultivating new patrons and augmenting current communities at the AGH. Among our recurring public programs like guided tours, Family Fun Days, Mindful Drawing, Free Thursdays, Storytime in the Gallery, AGH Reads, Speakers of Truth, virtual Fridays at Four, Youth Art Collective, and exciting initiatives from the past few years like Breaking Through the Vault Poetry Club, and QUARTZ: Queer Arts Hang, our education programs continued their presence in classrooms through the AGH: In-Class artist-led projects, with artist-educators teaching art forms that enhance the learning potential of class topics both in-person, and virtually to classrooms in remote territories. In co-production with Woodland Cultural Centre, the sold-out Radical Design Fashion Show highlighted the artistry of Indigenous designers around the country and brought topical audiences to the Gallery to experience *Radical Stitch* as well as Woodland's *By* Design: Fashionable Inspiration. Radical Stitch was also activated by a dedicated interactive ingallery beading room, with numerous workshops, conversations, and beading circles led by local Indigenous beaders. The 2023 AGH Festival presented 28 multi-disciplinary events which celebrated the 50th anniversary of Hip Hop and utilized talks, performances, workshops, and more to activate the whimsical WONDER exhibition as well as the new lobby mural installation *Reflect*, inviting many new arts and culture collaborators into the AGH network.

The popularity of many of this year's exhibitions played a pivotal role in attracting new and returning visitors. The engaging nature of exhibitions like Radical Stitch and WONDER resonated with our audiences, resulting in a significant increase in attendance throughout the year. In 2023 the AGH successfully rebounded to our pre-COVID attendance levels, exceeding our 2019 figures by an impressive 17.6%. The overwhelming response to *Radical Stitch* necessitated an extension of three months to accommodate its immense popularity.

The editorial coverage summary for 2023 indicates a substantial reach of 776 million potential news consumers, with 662 editorial mentions and 44 major editorial features. Notable mentions in 2023 include features in Globe and Mail, Hamilton Spectator, CBC Hamilton, and CHCH Morning Live, highlighting diverse art exhibitions and community engagement initiatives.

We are deeply grateful to the AGH's dedicated Board of Directors, Governors, devoted volunteers and staff, and our loyal members. We would like to extend our gratitude to our committed partners and donors, and acknowledge the continued support from all three levels of government who provide crucial operating support for the continued success of exhibitions and meaningful programs across learning, wellness, and community that enrich our Hamilton community and beyond.

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# **EXHIBITION HIGHLIGHTS 2023**

## DUANE LINKLATER: they have piled the stone / as they promised / without syrup February 11 - May 22, 2023

Presented by Partners in Art



The exhibition of new works *they have piled the stone / as they* promised / without syrup by Duane Linklater (Omaskêko Cree) explored the architecture of the Bishop Fauguier Memorial Chapel in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, the last remaining original structure on the site of the former Shingwauk Residential School for boys built in 1881, in part, by the children who were forced to attend residential school there. The main exhibited works abstracted an image of the rear façade of the chapel into nine parts, printed on linen, sewn together, stretched, and which Linklater further delineated with charcoal, cochineal, tea and other dyes to reveal the contrived and deceitful circumstances within which the children labored. These works were accompanied by a new installation of porcupine quills, and a media work titled Primary Use.

### **RADICAL STITCH** February 11 - August 27, 2023

Organized and circulated by The MacKenzie Art Gallery



The landmark exhibition *Radical Stitch* looked at the contemporary and transformative context of beading as a place of encounter, knowledge transfer, and acts of resistance through the aesthetic innovations of artists. Gathering top artists from across North America/Turtle Island, these works exemplified current and future directions of some of the most impressive practices and brought much-needed critical attention to the breadth and impact of beading as one of the defining mediums of contemporary Indigenous art on this continent.

## **BREATHING IN CHINA: Art, Ethics, and Environment** June 17 - December 31, 2023



In *Breathing in China*, fifteen featured artists used drawing, painting, sculpture, installation and video to explore the impact of smog as a symbol and symptom of our world in the time of climate emergency. For decades, China and the Global South have been definably impacted by smog, to the point of ecological destitution and human suffering. Guest curator Yan Zhou organized artist exchange trips between Canada and her native China to foster the creation of new works that responded to the current climate crisis.

Through performance, video, and sculpture, the exhibition examined intergenerational relationships, connecting Haq's mother's experience as a young Muslim bride arriving in Canada, with her own

experience as a mother, simultaneously interwoven with an awareness of her family's responsibilities toward the work of reconciliation as settlers on Haudenosaunee territories.

## WONDER: the real, the surreal, and the fantastic

September 23, 2023 - January 7, 2024

Significant shifts in our sense of reality caused by digital and sociopolitical factors drove the development of *WONDER*: *the real, the surreal, and the fantastic*, an exhibition which explored the unconscious mind, fantasies, and the dream world. This playful exhibition brought together historical and contemporary works that reimagine the everyday by staging new and provocative worlds, with the goal of challenging values and norms in search of new realities and creative freedom.

# **PROGRAMS & LEARNING HIGHLIGHTS**

2023 signalled a shift to accommodate audiences returning to pre-COVID levels of engagement. This was approached with a continued broadening of in-person offerings emphasizing social connection and experiential learning for AGH patrons and communities. Long standing programs like Artful Moments, QUARTZ: Queer Arts Hang, Youth Art Collective, Speakers of Truth, and Breaking Through the Vault Poetry Club saw further growth and increased reach into the community, along with numerous other ongoing activities. Public programming was seamlessly interwoven with and augmented critical themes in each exhibition; of note were exciting in-gallery activations related to surrealism, imaginative thinking, and highlighting Hamilton's diverse arts and Hip Hop scene, an immersive beading studio for collaborative teaching and learning, and a sold-out Radical Design Fashion Show co-produced with Woodland Cultural Centre.

### AGH LEARNING: ON SITE, IN CLASS, VIRTUAL

#### On Site

Exhibitions in 2023 inspired tours and studio programs for students from kindergarten through secondary school, with engagement growing towards pre-COVID numbers. 2023 also saw the return of large-scale symposia for secondary students relating to *Duane Linklater: they have piled the stone / as they promised / without syrup* and *Radical Stitch* as well as the popular Curatorial Symposium, offered to the secondary high skills major program of the HWDSB. On Site programs aimed to support a range of curriculum themes and critical skills for students using art on display and from the collection as provocation for dialogue and creative expression.

#### **In Class & Virtual**

AGH Artist-educators maintained a strong presence in classrooms through the In-Class artist-led projects. Over four classroom visits, students used a selected artforms to explore and enhance class topics of study. Options were many, and included visual and performing arts, creative writing, and more.

AGH: Virtual, the Gallery's national arts education program continued following its pilot in 2022. The program connected to remote classrooms from as far as Nelson, British Columbia to Labrador. With a combination of synchronous classroom visits and asynchronous presentations, students learned through artistic exploration.

### **PUBLIC PROGRAMMING**

#### **Interpretive Programs**

Artist talks in 2023 were as engaging and unique as the exhibitions that inspired them. The curators of *Radical Stitch*, Sherry Farrel Racette, Michelle LaVallee, Cathy Mattes, together with artist Ruth Cuthand spoke about the exhibition, the history and present of Indigenous beading, to a nearly sold-out audience. Artist, activist, and scholar, Syrus Marcus Ware spoke about his project, *In Movement: Training Sessions for Freedom Fighters*. Responding to *Breathing in China*, was an evening of dance and discussion with curator Yan Zhou, artist Lam Lau and dancer Naishi Wang. Finally, Chat & Chai, a special talk with artist Farheen Haq, her mother and her daughter about her exhibition, *I am my mother's daughter*.

The Beading Room anchored the *Radical Stitch*, exhibition with an array of workshops, conversation, beading circles, and interactive activities led by local Indigenous beaders. These activations inspired participants to gain a deeper understanding of, and appreciation for, the rich history, tradition, and artistry of Indigenous beading.

*Radical Stitch*, also provided an important opportunity to partner with Woodland Cultural Centre to co-produce a fashion show inspired by both *Radical Stitch* and Woodland's exhibition, *By Design: Fashionable Inspiration.* The sold-out Radical Design Fashion Show celebrated the designs of Jason Berg, Angela De Montigny, Dusty LeGrand/Mobilize, and Evan Ducharme. A shawl of beadwork pieces created by community members of both the AGH and Woodland Cultural Centre was also on display that evening.

Weekly guided tours, monthly Fridays at Four virtual presentations, and groups experiences continued to enliven exhibitions and the collection, creating vibrant conversations and reflections.

#### Festival

The 2023 AGH Festival presented 28 multi-disciplinary events spanning a 10-day period. The Festival focused on connecting events and performances to specific aspects of exhibitions or collection items on display in the Gallery, as well as celebrating the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Hip Hop and showcasing Hamilton's diverse arts and culture scene. Events included talks, musical performances, dance workshops, hands-on artmaking activities, professional development opportunities, film screenings, and an artist market. The Opening Night event, which also served as the official opening of *WONDER: the real, the surreal, and the fantastic*, welcomed over 400 visitors to the Gallery.

#### **Creative & Social Programs**

Breaking Through the Vault Poetry club, AGH Reads, and Free Thursday events were some of the key social programs offered in 2023. While these events were still regularly inspired by exhibitions, they offered a more casual, fun, and interactive experience as a complement to the more formal interpretive activities that support exhibitions. These programs also offered opportunities to connect with members and organizations in the community. Many were aimed at adult audiences but also offered a fun experience for all ages.

Summer in the City's Free Thursday events continued to welcome audiences from across Hamilton together to share in art making, music, games, karaoke, and dance parties. Vinyl Night, created in 2022-23 by Nathan Eugene Carson continued to be a highlight.

Studio programs and adult workshops included beading courses and family workshops in response to *Radical Stitch*, led by Indigenous artists, as well as Painting Uncorked, which returned in November and December.

#### **Programs for Children and Families**

Winterfest 2023 kicked off family programming with over 3000 people attending on Family Day. Monthly Family Fun Days and Storytime in the Gallery, both drop-in programs that serve young families with in-gallery and hands-on experiences, continued as consistently popular offerings. Camp programs returned to in-person programming in 2023, with soldout sessions for March Break and Summer Camps.

### WELLNESS

### **Artful Moments**

Following an important pivot and expansion to virtual programming in 2020-22, Artful Moments resumed in-person programs in 2023, with a range of wellness programs designed for specialized audiences, including people living with dementia, autism, social isolation, caregivers, and those who use social support. Artful Moments programs are built on a methodology called the Model for Successful Engagement, which centres each person, and focuses on empowering strengths through in-depth knowledge about participants. Using the Gallery as the foundation, it encourages attention to three pillars of engagement - environment, approach, and activity, to achieve the outcome of improved wellbeing for each participant. In 2023, programs were offered both virtually and in-person, providing an interactive and socially connective experience. The program was published as a book chapter in the publication, Art Education in Canadian Museums: Practice in Action, edited by Anita Sinner, Patricia Osler, and Boyd White.

Artful Moments: Shared Learning, a new web-based curriculum, was launched online this year, and will support museums across Canada in building programs for people living with dementia. Artful Moments: Shared Learning was presented at three public events in 2023 – the Geriatric Nursing Association of Ontario (Hamilton Chapter), the Hamilton Museum Educators Conference, and as part of a panel discussion at the Canadian Hospital Infrastructure Conference in Toronto. It also received the Ontario Museums Association Award for Excellence in Publication. In addition to formal presentations, Artful Moments professional development opportunities have been offered to regional museums, resulting in several training presentations and partnered programs.

- Speakers of Truth, a powerful series of round table discussions connected to Truth and Reconciliation, led by NaWalka-Geeshy Meegwun (Lyndon George). New topics were presented quarterly, highlighting current issues, traditions, and opportunities to come
- The Art of Creation project, co-produced with McMaster University and the Sloboda Lab, used art to explain the importance of health before and during pregnancy to the public. Following the year-long project, the culminating exhibition opened in the Jean and Ross Fischer Community Gallery in the fall, followed by talks and workshops with schools,
- The Evolving Wall seniors project in partnership with City Housing Hamilton expanded to several new buildings where the residents were invited to a series of painting workshops.
- Hamilton You Poets and the Breaking Through the Vault Poetry Club continued to develop
- Additional creative partnerships with (ACCA) Afro Caribbean Association, Keeping Six, Lit Live, The Hamilton Jewish Foundation, and Aeris Korper Contemporary Dance Company

For example, the VAE has sent out a number of communications to all volunteers to ensure everyone receives the same messaging and to hopefully encourage continued participation.






